When Christians hear the word incarnation, most think about the birth of Jesus, who personally demonstrated God's radical unity with humanity. But the first incarnation was the moment described in Genesis when God joined in unity with the physical universe and became the light inside of everything. The Incarnation is the fundamental pattern for all creation. We live within, and are ourselves a party to this ongoing incarnation—people, pets, and poppy seeds alike. Nothing lacks the divine impress. In this worldview, "a mature Christian sees Christ in everything and everyone."
